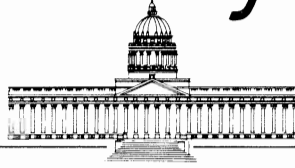

# Visionary Pioneer Remembered

**A** man of vision and foresight, a 20th century pioneer, a philanthropist, an entrepreneur, an untiring builder of education and the American political system — all are apt descriptions of Robert H. Hinckley, a Utah native whose remarkable life and multi-faceted career are unparalleled.

*Born June 8, 1891 in Fillmore, Utah, Robert H. Hinckley served a mission for the LDS Church to Germany. He married Abrelia Clarissa Seely in 1915 in the Salt Lake LDS Temple. During their 58-year marriage, the Hinckleys combined devotion to family with patriotism and political participation. It was Mrs. Hinckley who encouraged her husband to undertake the founding of the Hinckley Institute of Politics at the University of Utah. In her honor, Hinckley established a graduate scholarship for women at the University. Later, a friend created a graduate scholarship for men in Hinckley's name. Mrs. Hinckley died August 30, 1973. The Hinckleys bore four children: Robert H. Jr., John S., Betty H. Nibley and Paul, who is deceased. Hinckley died April 30, 1988 at his ranch, the Garden of Eden, Weber County, Utah.*

At a time when the horse and buggy were the country's main transportation mode, Hinckley launched one of the first automobile dealerships in the nation — only a year after the Dodge brothers built their first car in 1914. Displaying marketing acumen ahead of his time, Hinckley clinched sales by offering free driving lessons. First opened in Mt. Pleasant, the Hinckley dealership now operates in Ogden and Salt Lake City and is also involved in real estate and investment.

At the age of 88, Hinckley was honored by Chrysler Corp. for his achievements in the automobile business. The Hinckley family has maintained the dealership for seven decades through world wars, the Great Depression, recessions and other economic crises.

Because of his deeply held belief that to be a good citizen one must participate in politics, he sought office. He began his political career as a state legislator from Sanpete County and was mayor of Mount Pleasant.

Recognizing Hinckley's keen judgment and forward-thinking management skills, Gov. Henry Blood named him to direct Utah's relief programs during the depression. Later, Hinckley was appointed by President Franklin Roosevelt to serve the New Deal program as Utah director and western regional director of the Federal Emergency Relief Administration, as well as assistant administrator of the Works Progress Administration.

Hinckley was appointed to the five-member panel of the Civil Aeronautics Authority, forerunner to the Federal Aviation Administration.

By the time he was named chairman of the CAA, he was a major promoter of commercial aviation. Despite detractors, he undertook the building of the Washington National Airport. The facility, called the "Hinckley Folly" at the time of its construction, served 10 million people by 1947. The Salt Lake airport was also built

due to his leadership as CAA chairman. Hinckley was lauded for his attention to air safety when, in 1940, U.S. airlines went an entire year without a single fatality.

A colleague calls Hinckley "one of the real heroes of the Second World War" for imple-

menting the Civil Pilots Training Program. Correctly anticipating increased Japanese aggression, Hinckley designed a program to provide pilot training for college students at 700 universities. Critics called the program "Hinckley boondoggle," but criticism dissipated when Japan bombed Pearl Harbor four years later. To Hinckley's credit, 65,000 pilots were ready for final training upon U.S. entrance in World War II. Many people, including Air Force generals, believe Hinckley's foresight shortened the war by at least two years. In recognition of his courageous foresight, the FAA presented him in 1983 with their highest honor, the Award for Extraordinary Service.

After the war, Hinckley directed the Office of Contract Settlements at the request of President Harry Truman. He was responsible for negotiating settlements of defense contracts worth billions of dollars that were no longer needed in peacetime.

He believed wholeheartedly in democracy and in the strength that comes from ordinary people taking part in government. Utah, and the nation as well, have been beneficiaries of the services of (this) great and good man.

The same pioneer spirit that led his ancestors across the plains empowered Hinckley to tackle entrepreneurial ventures. With his close friend, Edward J. Noble, he founded the American Broadcasting Company in 1946 when national television was still a dream. For over two decades they helped build ABC into

the major network it is today. In Utah, he launched KALL Radio, Utah Pacific Airways and, in 1958, an Arabian horse and Welsh pony breeding farm at his Garden of Eden ranch.

He held executive positions as vice president and assistant to the president of Sperry Corp. and, in Salt Lake City, director of First Security Corp. and American Paper and Supply Co. He served on dozens of boards and committees, including the Utah State Board of Regents and the U of U Institutional Council.

Hinckley created the Hinckley Institute of Politics at the U of U in 1965 to "arouse responsible involvement in partisan politics and to deepen citizen awareness of politics as an honorable and significant profession." At that time, the Institute was one of very few similar organizations in the country. Through the years, the Institute has brought politicians and speakers from around the world to Utah and placed thousands of students in internships in Washington, D.C., and at state and local levels. In his latter years, when asked by a reporter to

established a fellowship at BYU in memory of their father. Hinckley also donated scholarship funds to Weber State College, Utah State University and the U of U.

Among the many honors he received were the B'nai B'rith Citizen of Achievement Award, 1967; the Brotherhood Award of the Utah Chapter of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, 1977; and inductions into the Beehive Hall of Fame and the Utah Auto Dealers Hall of Fame in 1987. Both the U of U and BYU be-

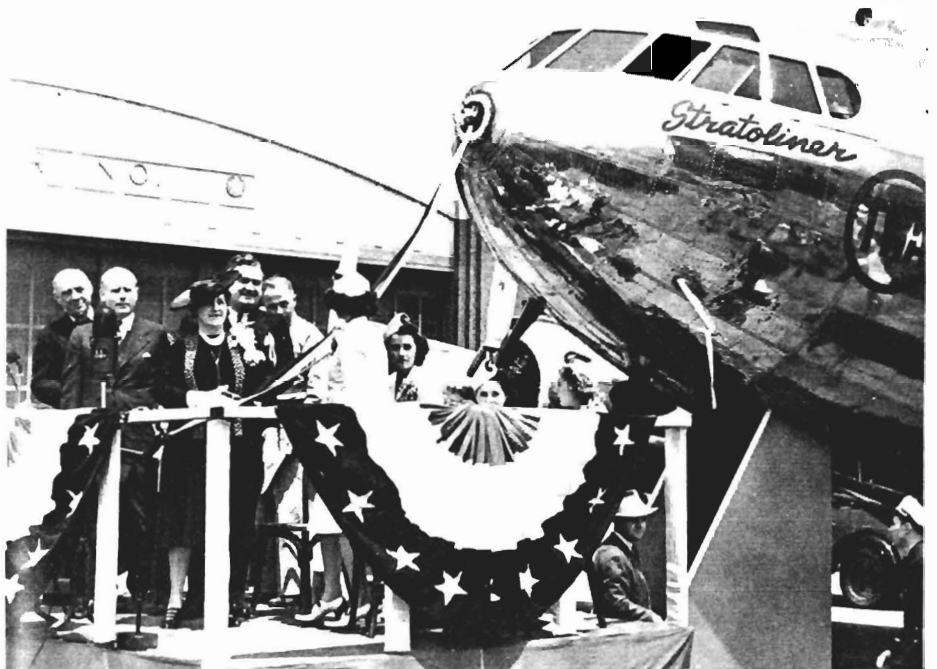
stowed honorary doctorate degrees. Gov. Calvin Rampton hosted an appreciation dinner in Hinckley's honor in 1975, calling him a 20th century Utah pioneer.

Just prior to his death Hinckley, along with other Ira N. Hinckley descendants, purchased Cove Fort. This historic Utah pioneer fortress was built by Robert Hinckley's grandfather, Ira N. Hinckley, and was the birthplace of his father, Edwin S. Hinckley. It was donated to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and will be restored as a visitors center.

This good man — Robert Hinckley — accomplished all he did with the steadfast support of his fine wife, Abrelia.

**Hinckley was an American patriot who neither wore his patriotism on his coat sleeve nor declaimed it from the self-aggrandizing public spotlight. He practiced it quietly and consistently throughout each hour and day of his long and valuable life.**

## Scott M. Matheson Forum Funds Visitor

John J. Gunther, prominent Washington, D.C., lobbyist, was the Scott M. Matheson Visiting Professor and Politician-in-Residence at the Hinckley Institute during the Winter and Spring Quarters 1988. While at the Institute, Gunther spoke at Coffee & Politics programs, made classroom visits and taught a class in local government. He also completed his book, *The History of Federal-City Relations in the United States*.

Gunther was general counsel and executive director of the United States Conference of Mayors for 30 years and also served as executive director of the U.S. Conference of Local Health Offices and City Human Service Officials. He is a member of the Bar of the U.S. Supreme Court and served in 1984 as a Fellow of the Institute of Politics, John F. Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University.

"The thing I enjoyed most about my stay at the Hinckley Institute was the opportunity to talk to students about government," Gunther says. "I found the students to be bright and eager to ask questions about a broad range of issues."

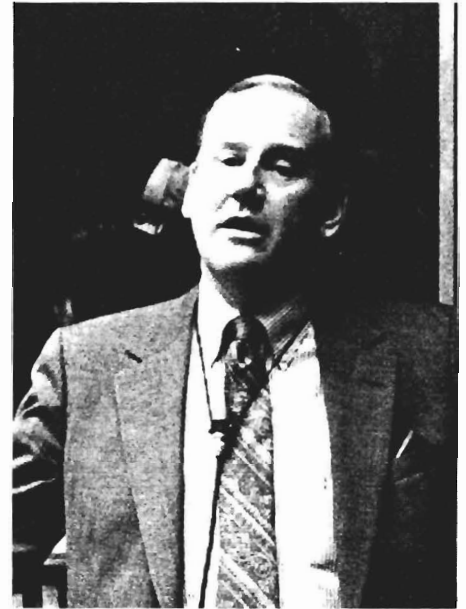
## Interns Meet on Capitol Hill

## Students Travel to Washington, D.C., for Leadership Training

Twelve U of U students, directed by Holly Nissalke, 1987 student participant, received first-hand advice from leaders in Washington, D.C., at the "Leaders on Leadership" symposium at the Washington Center. They joined with 200 students from across the country and spent two intensive weeks studying leadership in the public, private and independent sectors.

Among the speakers were Thomas Griscom, director of communications for the Office of the President of the U.S.; Clarence Thomas, chairman of the EEO; Richard Schubert, president of the American Red Cross; and Knight Kiplinger, president and editor of *The Kiplinger Report*. Students visited *U.S. News and World Report* to hear about "The Media's Influence on Leader-

ship" from editor, David Gergen, and they discussed the presidential election with CNN political director, Christine Dolan. Communication majors were invited to ABC News to meet with David Brinkley.

Schedules were tight, with morning briefings, on-site visits and focus groups for discussions of issues ranging from coalition building and women and minorities to international policy. "It was great to get together with students from other parts of the country and discuss these important issues. There are a lot of different opinions out there.... This trip made me realize that every one of us must get involved in government. What we say and do matters," says Lisa Morgan.

## Abrelia Clarissa Hinckley Scholarships Awarded

Two former interns have been awarded \$3,500 Abrelia Clarissa Hinckley Scholarships. Kristi Draper, a political science graduate pursuing a Master of Public Administration degree, is recipient of the 1987 scholarship, and Renee M. Jimenez, a behavioral science and health

graduate and entering freshman law student, has been awarded the 1988 scholarship.

Draper served Hinckley internships with the Utah State Legislature, the Dan Marriott gubernatorial campaign and Salt Lake County Administrative Services. She is presently employed as

a legislative and intergovernmental relations assistant with that office. She will receive her MPA in 1989 and hopes to continue working with Salt Lake County. Draper describes the county environment as "user friendly" and says it gives her tremendous opportunities to serve the public. She currently is involved with Craig Moody's legislative reelection campaign and is a member of the Utah Chapter of Professional Republican Women. She runs the Salt Lake County Commissioner-for-a-Day Program, a one-day microcosm that typifies Hinckley Institute goals and teaches the value of public service. She has long-range plans to serve as a Utah state legislator.

Jimenez has been active in student government at the U of U. She served as president of the Chicano Student Association, chair of the Ombudsman Board for ASUU and student representative on the U of U Publications Council. She also was a legislative intern with the Utah attorney general's office. Jimenez is continuing her studies at the U of U College of Law.

The scholarship was established in 1975 by Robert H. Hinckley as a memorial to his wife, Abrelia Clarissa, and is awarded to graduate students whose interests, formal training and life goals include a commitment to politics and to the ideals which guided Mrs. Hinckley's life.

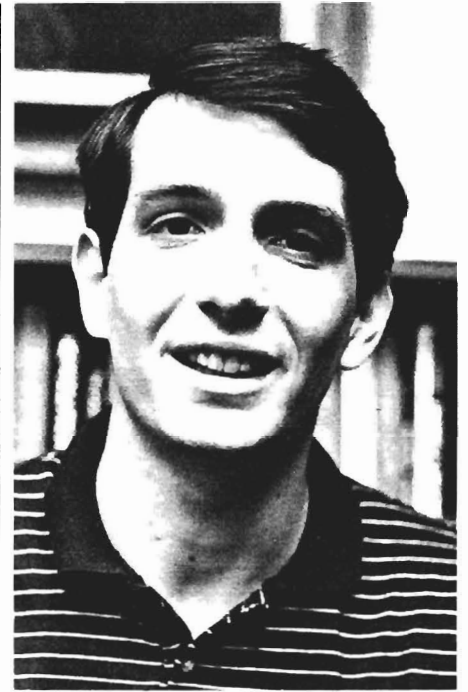

## Study Grants Awarded

## Law Students Win Robert H. Hinckley Graduate Scholarships

Two U of U law students, both former Hinckley interns, have been awarded \$3,500 Robert H. Hinckley Graduate Scholarships. James Gilson, a political science and English graduate, was named the 1987 Hinckley scholar, and Jeffrey Howe, a political science graduate, received the 1988 scholarship.

Gilson graduated with high honors from the U of U and was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. He will receive his law degree in May 1989. He served Hinckley internships with the Utah State Legislature, the Bureau of Reclamation and Senator Orrin Hatch in Washington, D.C. "For as long as I can remember," Gilson says, "I have been interested in the law and in everything

that is associated with politics." He has been active in local politics and plans some day to run for public office.

Howe graduated from the U of U *summa cum laude* and was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. He also studied music at the Peabody Conservatory of Music at Johns Hopkins University but returned to Utah to major in political science and pre-law studies. Howe served Hinckley internships with the Utah State Legislature and the U.S. Supreme Court. He is interested in constitutional law and hopes to work for a federal judge after graduation from law school. "I feel a great responsibility to be involved with and dedicated to public issues," Howe says.

## First R. J. Snow Intern Selected

David Fowers, a U of U junior majoring in electrical engineering, is the recipient of the Hinckley Institute's first R. J. Snow Internship in Public Policy. He was assigned to the Office of Public Liaison in the White House where he saw the president on an almost daily basis. One of the highlights of his internship was being in the Oval Office while the president was there. "This was unbelievable," says Fowers. "I was in the Oval Office at the White House with the president of the United States! I also met Vice President George Bush, Chief of Staff Howard Baker, Cabinet members, members of Congress and foreign leaders. The internship was a marvelous opportunity, a once-in-a-lifetime experience.

Fowers was a Hinckley intern at the Utah State Legislature during the 1988 session. He has been active in campus and community politics and in 1984 became the youngest Electoral College member in history. He also was elected as a delegate to the 1988 Republican National Convention. "Politics is something which mag-

netically draws me. I am intrigued by foreign policy, current events...all of politics. I would like some day to work in public service."

was established in 1986 by a group of former Hinckley Institute interns in honor of Dr. R. J. Snow, who was director of the Institute for 10 years.

## Nelson and Van Dijk Honored as Ben D. Wood Interns

Stuart Nelson and Tineke Van Dijk have been designated Ben D. Wood Interns for 1987-88. Nelson, a Ph.D. candidate in political science, has a bachelor's degree in journalism and a Master of Public Administration degree. Van Dijk is a communication senior at the U of U.

As an intern in Washington, D.C., with Benchmarks, Inc., a consulting firm in international development, Nelson conducted research and helped write a U.S. congressional report on the current working relationship between the Peace Corps and the Agency for International Development. Prior to his internship, Nelson had worked with the Andean Children's Foundation, a private organization dedicated to assisting the rural poor of the high Andes region. "My experience with Benchmarks

brought some excellent balance to my previously limited perspective of what development is all about," Nelson says. "It was interesting to go from the lonely, isolated villages of Bolivia last summer, where human needs are so obvious, to the policy-making environment of Washington, where politics is so much a part of the process." Nelson hopes to complete his Ph.D. with an international development focus and aspires to a career in which teaching, research and consulting opportunities will allow him to work in the developing countries of Latin America, Africa and the Middle East.

Van Dijk worked with the Committee for Education Funding, a Washington, D.C., lobbying organization. She is an independent regis-

tered lobbyist, and the internship gave her close-up experience at the heart of the lobbying process in Washington, D.C. Van Dijk currently serves as president of the board of directors for Utahns Against Hunger. She also works as a client services coordinator for Utah Legal Services.

The Ben D. Wood Endowment was established in 1984 to support and recognize outstanding students serving public policy internships in Washington, D.C. Funding was provided through a major grant from Wood, a long-time friend of Robert H. Hinckley, with matching funds from IBM. Wood dedicated much of his career to education, serving for 25 years as director of the Bureau of Education Research.

## Four Interns Win Siciliano Honors

Based on nominations from organizations that regularly host Hinckley interns, four students have been designated Rocco C. Siciliano interns for outstanding performance in Washington, D.C., internships during 1987-88. Hannah Horsley served an internship with the administrator of the U.S. courts; Renee Monson interned for the Senate Conference Committee; Laura Snow was with the U.S. Supreme Court; and James Hall served a six-month internship at the National Science Foundation.

Hannah Horsley is a June 1988 political science and philosophy honors graduate. Her assignment was with the bankruptcy division of the U.S. courts, where she researched and wrote a reference book for the chief judges. "Up until now, not much attention has been given to bankruptcy law in the courts. The laws used to be very vague, with only a sentence or two mentioning bankruptcy procedure," comments Horsley. "My internship was particularly valuable to me, because I had my own independent research project. Working closely like that on Washington issues helped me better understand the way the government, Congress and federal judiciary function together." Horsley has served on several U of U committees, including the ASUU Supreme Court and the Honors Student Advisory Committee.

Renee Monson, a junior in political science, worked on the media aspect of the Senate Conference Committee by assisting with the filming of hearings. She also created a computer reference program which enables senators to recall specific hearing sessions for study. Monson says her experience has made it easier for her to apply what she has learned in her classroom studies of politics. "I developed a much more realistic understanding of how the Senate

works. Working right on the Senate floor, I could see how priorities and time constraints, things I wouldn't have thought about, influenced the way they made their decisions." Monson plans to attend law school and currently works at a law firm in Salt Lake City.

Laura Snow, a senior majoring in French, served an internship with the Office of the Curator at the U.S. Supreme Court. She assisted the curator's staff in the research, organization and assembly of an exhibit commemorating the 200th anniversary of the Constitution; presented daily courtroom lectures to the public; and conducted private tours of the Supreme Court building for foreign visitors, school groups and guests of the justices. "The internship," says Snow, "gave me the opportunity to meet a variety of people — from lawyers, ambassadors

and foreign dignitaries to elementary school children — and to explain to them how the judicial branch works." Snow is a member of Phi Eta Sigma, Golden Key and Pi Delta Phi honor societies and Mortar Board. She hosted "Books & Banter" for the Hinckley Institute Winter Quarter 1988. She participated in the U of U Study Abroad Program in Switzerland.

James Hall, a 1988 political science *cum laude* graduate, spent two quarters at the National Science Foundation in the Office of Legislative and Public Affairs. He was given assignments in every facet of the office operation, from covering House and Senate hearings to researching special interest groups in congressional districts and developing a multi-media campaign for a public service advertisement. Hall's main responsibilities revolved around National Science & Technology Week, a public awareness campaign geared to increasing grass roots support for science, engineering and technical education in America. He worked with the legislative analyst and the legislative issues group. "I sat through a lot of very long hearings, took notes and reported on the issues that would affect the Science Foundation, our budget or our programs." He also was responsible for tracking bills as they moved through Congress and for keeping the staff aware of upcoming legislation. "I was assigned jobs that really mattered...I was treated as one of the staff and was expected to perform as a regular employee...an important part of the team," says Hall. Hall plans to obtain a graduate degree, probably in public administration or foreign relations. Currently, he is working for the Salt Lake City Council as a staff assistant.

In 1980, Rocco C. Siciliano and his company, ARA Services, established the Siciliano Endowment at the Hinckley Institute to fund internships in public policy. They have continued to increase the original endowment to the point where it now funds more than a dozen internships annually.

## Harris and Barlow Named Governor Simon Bamberger Interns

Lynell Harris, 1988 political science graduate, and Allison Barlow, senior history major, were awarded Governor Simon Bamberger Internships in State Policy for 1987-88.

Harris, who served as a Hinckley intern at the 1987 Utah state legislative session, returned to the state Capitol in 1988 as legislative intern coordinator. She was at the Capitol every day of the session, supervising and assisting 40 student interns. She also helped Ted Wilson, director of the Institute, teach the intern training class. "This experience was very valuable for me, because it put me in direct contact with state legislators," Harris says. She hopes one day to run for the legislature herself. "I have always been politically active. I believe that living in different areas of the world, including Japan for five years, really sharpened my interest in cities and government." Harris is currently legislative chairman for District 31.

Barlow's internship took her to Washington, D.C., to serve as assistant to the director of the Utah governor's office. Her responsibilities were to write and send weekly reports to Governor Bamberger's aides in Utah to keep them informed of legislation in Washington which might affect Utah. She attended congressional hearings and sub-committee meetings, mostly on the supercollider and the Wilburg mine disaster. "I never realized how many hearings and discussions take place before legislation is even considered," she says. "It was great to have the opportunity to experience these things." Barlow worked as an ASUU presidential campaign manager in 1987 and was active in the Greek system. She will complete her undergraduate degree Autumn Quarter 1988 and plans to attend graduate school.

The Governor Simon Bamberger Internship in State Policy is funded through a grant from the Herbert I. and Elsa B. Michael Foundation, long-time benefactor of the U of U. Elsa Bamberger Michael was a direct descendant of Simon Bamberger, Utah's fourth governor, who served from 1916 to 1920.

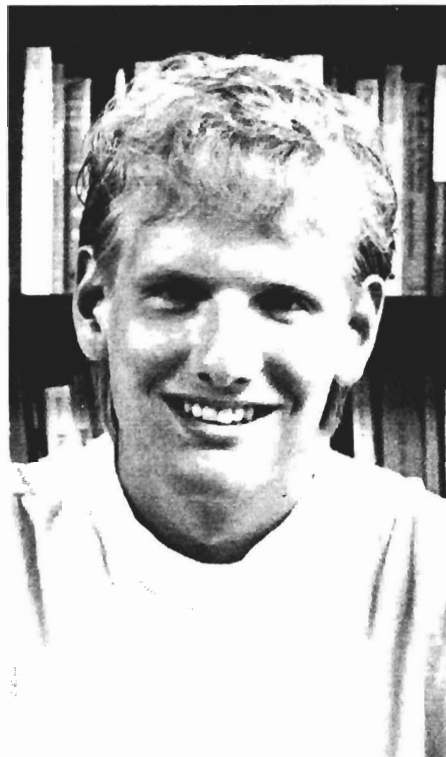
## Steven Engen Wins Eccles Honor

He was a long-time friend and associate of Robert H. Hinckley.

## Hinckley Intern Receives Truman Scholarship

Flynn Andrizzi, U of U sophomore majoring in political science and public relations, is one of 105 students nationwide to be awarded a Harry S. Truman Scholarship. He is the only Utahn to receive the scholarship, which covers tuition, fees, books and room and board to a maximum of \$7,500 annually for up to four years.

Andrizzi was nominated by a committee composed of Hinckley Institute administrators, a U of U faculty representative and two former Truman scholars. Andrizzi is interested in a career in city government and plans to pursue graduate work in public administration. He has served internships with the Utah League of Cities and Towns, the Salt Lake City Task Force for the Homeless and the National League of Cities in Washington, D.C. In 1987 he served as chair of the Associated Students of the U of U Public Affairs Board and was chief lobbyist at the Utah State Legislature.

The scholarship is awarded annually to one nominee from each state and to a matching number at-large. The program is designed to give students who have potential for leadership in any phase of government the opportunity to achieve success in public service.

David Fowers, also a Hinckley intern, was chosen as the Utah alternate.

## Annual Intern Alumni Banquet Held

Approximately 250 former interns and guests attended the annual intern alumni banquet May 10, 1988 at the U of U. Guest speaker was Dr. John Kenneth Galbraith, professor of economics, Harvard University.

Emphasizing his great concern about the national deficit and the U.S. trade imbalance, Galbraith addressed America's economic challenges, historically and looking to the future. Also, Galbraith noted the great contributions of native Utahns Robert H. Hinckley and Marriner S. Eccles. Hinckley was assistant secretary of commerce for aviation under President Franklin D. Roosevelt and director of contract settlement under President Harry S. Truman. Eccles served as chairman of the Federal Reserve Board under President Roosevelt.

Galbraith is the Paul M. Warburg Professor of Economics Emeritus at Harvard University. He was a Social Science Research Council Fellow at the University of Cambridge and has taught at Princeton and the University of California at Berkeley. His distinguished political career includes years of serving as an advisor to various Democratic administrations. He was awarded the Medal of Freedom by President Harry S. Truman.

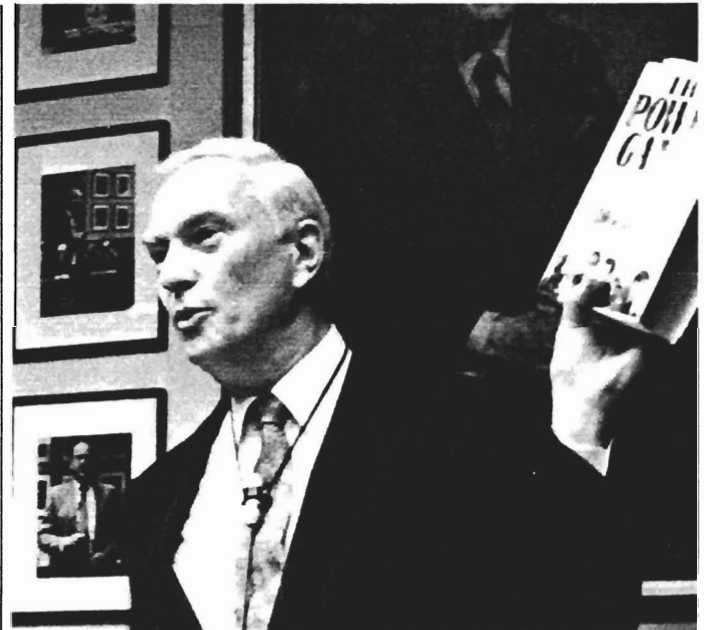

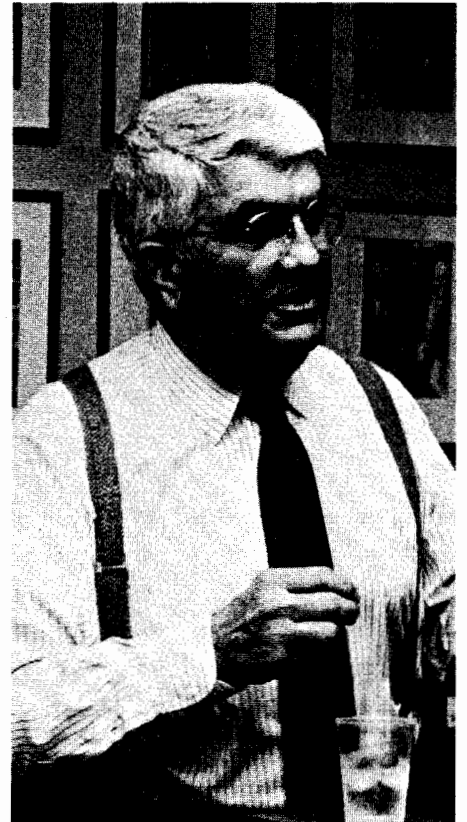

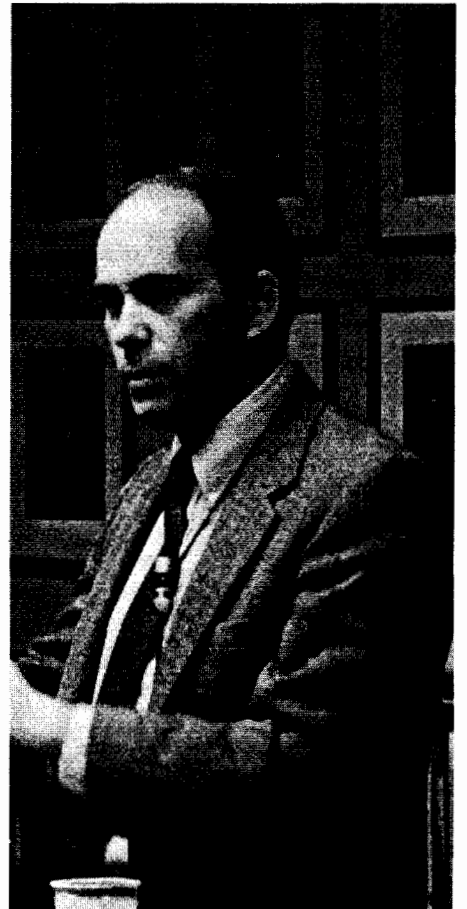
